Update from the Supervisor's Office

John Syracuse, Newfane Town Supervisor

As your newly elected Town Supervisor, I would like to take this time to say "Hello" to all of you, and in particular those whom I have yet to meet. Some will recognize me from my 18-year service as your County Legislator. I understand I have some big shoes to fill, but I want you to know I am more than excited to take on that challenge. One of the strengths I bring to the office is that over the years I have worked closely with all levels of Niagara County government, in addition to working with various State and Federal officials too. I have also worked in collaboration with many Niagara County towns and villages.

One glaring observation I have made over the years is that transitions from one administration to another are never easy. That is why, from day one, I purposely connected with the various Town Consultants, Electeds, Department Heads and our employees in order to secure the most efficient and successful transition into day-to-day operations and to ensure the longer-term objectives are realized. Listed below are some brief updates of the major initiatives requiring a smooth transition:

Break Wall and Federal Piers (REDI)

Construction is almost complete. In fact, estimates put this job at 93% completion rate. We are waiting on the addition of fishing platforms and updates to Navigational lights this year.

Inner Harbor Stabilization and Berm Construction at the West Beach (REDI)

These 2 initiatives will be starting this construction season. I would like to make note that to ensure these 2 projects, along with the other REDI Project--Break Wall and Federal Pier enhancements-- proceed accordingly, the Town Board and I unanimously approved the hiring of Tim Horanburg as a Consultant for these construction projects. Tim will be paid through an apportionment of my salary.

Ontario Street Water Line Improvements

Reconstruction and updates to this section of water delivery was under way several weeks ago. Part of the REDI Grant included repaving Lockport St, beginning at Route 18 and continuing along the Ontario-Cooper-East Main St. loop. It was determined that these water lines be replaced prior to paving. Funding for the water line was provided through the American Rescue Plan (COVID). Discussions continue concerning improvements to the streetscape and enhancements to the restrooms in the Ontario Street Parking lot adjacent to Hedley and Zillig Marina.

Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP)

Updates to the WWTP will begin this year at our aged facility. In order to help mitigate the costs of these capital improvements, the Town and Village of Wilson have agreed to share services. The Village will pay the Town to treat their waste water. In addition to these revenues, the Town was awarded \$1 million from a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) which will further defray our costs.

FEMA Lighthouse Shoreline Reconstruction Project

As a result of the historic flooding of Lake Ontario, we were able to secure a FEMA matching grant to rehabilitate the shoreline that sits just north of our replica lighthouse on Olcott. As of the time of this publication, the town is still working through the bid process.

I would also like to take this opportunity to tell you about some of the personnel changes at town hall since 1/1/22:

Code Enforcement Officer/Building Inspector:

Mike Klock was hired 1/1/22 to take over duties as our Code Enforcement Officer/Building Inspector due to the retirement of Doug Nankey. This job was reclassified as a Part-Time, no benefit position in an effort to contain costs.

Account Clerk/Confidential Assistant to the Supervisor's Office:

In February, our Senior Accounts Clerk, Kristie Jessen resigned from the position of Senior Accounts Clerk. In another bold move to contain costs, and with the support of the Town Board, what was once a full-time with benefits position is now a part-time, no benefits position that also combines administrative assistance in the form of a Confidential Assistant to the Supervisor's Office. Mary Zeller has been appointed to this position and we are all excited to have her on board in this extremely important position.

Payroll Clerk/Assistant to the Assessor:

In the last personnel move, Christine Nilson, who was being shared with the clerk's office, is now being shared with the assessor's office. In addition, I have implemented a cross-training program which will also allow Christine to provide back-up to Mary Zeller and other departments when needed. These personnel moves will allow us to not only provide the utmost in customer service to town residents and those visiting outside our locale but will ensure smooth and efficient delivery of the many services we offer.

Grant Updates

Under the leadership of Tim Horanburg, the Town was the successful recipient of 2 matching grants. One was to update our Local Waterfront Revitalization Program (LWRP). The other was a cyber security grant. The LWRP update is moving along. A committee was convened in August of last year in order to get acquainted with the process. As of today, the consultant is completing GIS mapping which outlines the water front boundaries. We look to reconvene some time in April/May. The cyber security grant is being managed by the Town's IT specialist. We look to have updates fully in place before August 2022.

At the time of this writing, I have been in office for 9 weeks. I have presided over 3 major weather events. The first was the winter storm on January 17th which required the decision to close the Town Hall, the other was the flooding of February 18 caused by the melting of the snow from the winter storm, and lastly the wind storm that included power failures along with large trees damaging homes in Olcott and Newfane. In each of these instances, our professionals from Highway, Water/Sewer, Miller Hose, Olcott Fire Co and Wrights Corners FD performed at the highest level.

Lastly, I want to leave you with one more update. Some of you may have noticed I have been posting brief video updates to the community from our website townofnewfane.com. I find this to be a great way to maximize my ability to provide a quick synopsis of the business occurring from the Supervisor's Office. My goal is to arrange for these to take place in 3-4 week intervals. I hope you find them beneficial.

Happy Spring 2022! We find ourselves on the tail end of another tough and exhausting Winter. I want to thank everyone for their patience and strength during this time and we have many positive things to look forward to this year. Niagara County is financially stable, allowing increased investment in infrastructure, parks, social services, and economic development. There are many projects breaking ground this year both in Newfane and across the County which will help spark more development and private investment. Many challenges still face us, but I believe if we continue to address these issues with common sense and teamwork, there is no task too large. Skilled Labor shortages, inflation, increased costs to businesses, Covid restrictions, lack of county wide broadband, shortage of EMS workers and first responders, supply chain issues, unfunded NYS mandates, laws infringing our rights, NYS siting of industrial solar on farmland, etc.

These are just some of the issues being worked on, and we need to be expedient in our efforts. These challenges are not unique to Niagara County, but if we are able to find solutions efficiently, it will place Niagara County in a very attractive spot to attract business growth, private investment, and new residents. I am excited about the future of Niagara County, and I hope you are too.

Covid-19:

Thankfully, we are seeing a sharp decrease in cases and hospitalizations. Our children have been able to remove their masks, and as we inch closer to Spring/Summer, our lives are beginning to feel normal again. I am proud of the Counties response to the Covid-19 Pandemic. At the county level, we were able to (and still are) operate efficient and widespread vaccination/booster clinics, provide masks to businesses and first responders, hand out more than 10,000+ at-home test kits, and circulate information and resources to the public so that everyone had information they needed in order to protect themselves and stay healthy. Recently, we voted against implementing an unfunded state mask mandate, that would have saw our county health department direct personnel away from daily responsibilities to inspect and fine our local businesses if residents did not follow the state mandate. We felt that was not fair to the County, to local businesses, and to our staff who have worked so hard throughout the pandemic. "Lessons Learned" is a topic I learned through Six Sigma training, and now is the time to reflect on the past two years battling Covid and to find out what worked, what didn't, and where we can improve. Whether we see another covid variant or some other pandemic, we need to be proactive in our processes and be prepared for any other challenge that may encounter in the future.

Krull Park:

I am happy to see continuous improvement and investment in Krull Park, and 2022 will see many exciting projects come to life. Newfane Tennis was temporarily without a home court due to the large capital improvement project at the High School. We were able to make the courts at Krull Park available to the team and even received grant money to resurface the courts for their season. Future use of these courts will have the option for Pickleball, which is growing in popularity. Attendance at the park has increased over the years so the restroom building toward the back of the park will be replaced and fully ADA compliant. A new Eagle Scout Trail system will be installed for outdoor activities and nature trail. Also, due to tree loss caused by storms and invasive bugs, a NYS Grant has provided 120 new trees for our park system which will help replace the lost trees and also provide new habitat for birds/animals. A variety of tree species will be planted in Krull Park bringing new life and colors to the park. Parks Department is looking for seasonal workers (18yo+) to work around our parks helping with upkeep and maintenance. Please visit the County website for more information on employment opportunities or to reserve pavilions inside the park.

Infrastructure:

After another harsh winters, DPW and Highway crews will be assessing potholes and damaged roadways. Paving projects will be underway shortly. Wilson-Burt Rd between Coomer and McClew will have a new concrete culvert bridge installed to replace aging infrastructure and allow better flow through the drainage ditch. The County has created a task force to help coordinate local efforts creating bike paths and nature trails between our rural towns. Connecting our towns/villages with safe bike paths will increase tourism, promote health and exercise, and increase quality of life. I look forward to working with this group and researching new recreational opportunities throughout Newfane and the entire 14th District.

It has been a busy start to 2022 and I am working very hard to represent all the residents of Newfane. Never hesitate to contact me with any questions, or concerns, or just to talk about issues in our area.



STATE SENATOR ROB ORTT & NEWFANE HISTORY STUDENTS HOLD "DEMOCRACY DISCUSSION"

NEWFANE, NY – This past February, I was proud to join Newfane Middle School students during their U.S. History class to discuss civics, history, and the importance of political participation. At this event, the students and I were able to have some face-to-face time together, and they had the opportunity to ask me a few important questions. During my meeting with the students, I was also able to speak with them about the ins and outs of local and State Government, which is an often overlooked yet critical component of our Democratic Republic.

It was so nice meeting with these students from Newfane Middle School. They all had an eagerness to learn about New York and American History, and our country's political system. We were able to talk about the importance of voting in elections, using free speech, and participating in our community. Our nation's future is bright with students like these preparing to be engaged, informed, hard-working citizens.

While speaking at this meeting, one of the topics that I wanted to cover and stress the most was the importance of voting – a sacred right of all American citizens. While most of the students knew that every four years, the citizens of our country vote for a U.S. President, I wanted to shine a light on the fact that the people vote for our state and federal legislators every two years. This includes individuals such as myself. I also discussed the importance of local elections and how these elections can be just as, if not more, significant than the larger state and nationwide ones. While the presidential election may get all of the attention, state and local election have impacts that are closer to home and require engagement from the citizenry just as much as the federal

It's our job as elected officials to represent the best interests of all New Yorkers – including our children. Over the last few years, it seems like many elected have discounted or completely forgotten about our children. Our jobs and our entire Democracy depend on our representation of all New Yorkers, not just those who vote for us.

Finally, I can't thank Newfane Middle School and Ms. Faery's class enough for reaching out to me and allowing me to come to their school and speak with them.

NORRIS RENEWS PLAN TO ADDRESS STATE GASOLINE TAX

People in Western New York have no choice but to drive. Gasoline is as essential to our daily lives as the air we breathe, but with prices at over \$4.40 a gallon and quickly rising, it's a cost that people just cannot afford. I am particularly concerned about constituents in rural areas, seniors and low-income workers, including young families, who are already scraping by. Albany needs to hear this message and take swift action.

For a long time I have been working to encourage our state leaders to address this issue. Before prices began to rise, I was a sponsor of bills that would reduce taxes collected on motor fuels. Last year, I helped introduce the Inflation Relief and Consumer Protection Plan (A.8481) to not only eliminate taxes on gasoline but other household essentials as well. Calling on leaders to enact this plan was my first order of business as the session reconvened this year.

But now that the situation has escalated it's no longer enough. That's why I am reaching across the aisle to co-sponsor a new bill (awaiting bill number) that would suspend the entire state's share of taxes on motor fuels for the next year to combat the rising costs caused by inflation and the war in Ukraine. Our new bill would provide nearly \$0.50 per gallon in savings if enacted.

Not only does our state have a \$2 billion budget surplus this year, we also have federal aid coming in to offset the cost of any revenue loss to the state. This funding could counterbalance the cost of reducing or eliminating the tax all together, depending on what final agreement Gov. Hochul and legislative leaders come to on the budget. She said the most important thing is keeping people going and keeping the economy moving.

In fact, I believe if the governor and leaders use the surplus and federal aid wisely they could not only afford to eliminate the gas tax but also afford to make historic investments in up-state and Western New York infrastructure. These much-needed improvements would provide a lasting effect on motorists' safety, quality of life, miles-per-gallon fuel efficiency and, of course, greatly improve regional economies around our state. This investment would place the governor among those who have made permanent progress for our state.

That's why I proposed to the governor and legislative leaders that they increase investments across the board with local infrastructure programs like CHIPS (the Consolidated Local Street and Highway Program), Extreme Winter Recovery, PAVE-NY and more. I also hope her \$100 million Operation Pave Our Pothole program is made permanent.

We need our infrastructure to be safe for everyday travel but we also rely on it for the transportation of consumer goods and our economy. As our reliance has shifted on a more global economy, improvements are needed and long overdue, but our local governments need the funding from Albany. This budget must take all of these factors into account and provide the money need-ed for infrastructure and to protect motorists from potholes, crumbling bridges and skyrocketing gas prices.

Assemblyman Mike Norris (R,C-Lockport) also serves as the Chairman of the Assembly Minority Conference. He represents the 144th Assembly District which includes portions of Erie, Niagara and Orleans Counties. He is a member of the Assembly Ways and Means and Transportation committees.

News from our Niagara County Sheriff's



An update from Niagara County Sheriff Michael J. Filicetti:

The Welfare Fraud Unit is an integral partnership between the Department of Social Services and the Sheriff's Office. The unit is responsible for investigating and charging those who take advantage of important services designed to help those in need. In 2021, NCSO's two primary Investigators made 61 total arrests for offenses such as Welfare Fraud, Grand Larceny, Offering a False Instrument for Filing, and Misuse of Food Stamps. Their efforts saved taxpayers \$226,617 in benefit payments obtained through fraud, and over the course of five years, the Unit has saved/recovered more than \$1.6 million in funding!

I am proud to announce that the Niagara County Sheriff's Office Forensic Laboratory successfully completed a reassessment to secure a continuation of their International Standard Organization 17025 Accreditation to the ANSI National Accreditation Board. The Board is the longest established provider of accreditation based on standards set forth by the International Standard Organization of the United States. During this assessment process, each discipline must undergo protocol and case work critique by several technical assessors who evaluate the competence of the forensic service provider and conformance with accreditation requirements. I am very proud of the high quality work our team completes every day to achieve this honor.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to warn you about the latest fraud to occur in our community. NCSO has received several reports of an individual calling and identifying themselves as a representative of the Niagara County Sheriff's Office. They proceed to advise you of a warrant for your arrest for failing to appear for jury duty. For a \$500 fee, the scammer offers to take care of this warrant for you. The caller ID number may even be the same or close to the Sheriff's Office (716-438-3393) utilizing an emulator device. This is a fraud, and please do not pay any funds. Please know that Law Enforcement will not call you regarding a debt owed, fee outstanding, or call for a cash donation. Do not give out personal information like your social security number, credit/debit card numbers or anything else if someone contacts you. And, as always with scams, if you are contacted to pay a fine/fee/overpayment and the person demands that you pay the debt in gift cards, wire transfers, cash, or cryptocurrency, this is without a doubt a fraud.

It seems like only yesterday when Olcott Beach Carousel Park (OBCP) had its grand opening on May 17, 2003. At that time the park opened with a newly refurbished carousel roundhouse and a 1928 Herschell-Spillman carousel. The park looked nothing like it looks today. It was basically an empty lot with a "One Tired Horse" (now gone) sculpture from the Art on Wheels Project.

Twenty years later, the park is a sparkling jewel that features five vintage kiddie rides, a vintage arcade, a Pick Up a Duck Game, and seven vintage Skeeball machines; all under cover except for the vintage kiddie Ferris Wheel. All rides are still 25¢; the same price as when we opened in 2003!



COOKING WITH THE CLERK'S

Bruschetta Dressing

2 tbs. Thyme 1 cup Olive Oil
2 tbs. Rosemary 1 cup Vegetable Oil
4 cup Dijon 1 tbs. pepper
1 cup Balsamic Vinegar 1 tbs. salt

Ingredients

Diced Tomatoes Garlic
Basil Salt
Onion Pepper

Preheat oven to 375 ° cut baguette into ½ inch slices. Place on baking sheet and toast for 3-5 minutes. Turn over and do the same on the other side just so they don't get soggy. Mix Dressing with Ingredients and spread on baguette. Top with your preference of cheese and bake until melted.)

Cucumber Sandwiches

Ingredients:

12 slices white bread 1 English cucumber 8 ounces cream cheese, softened 4 cup mayo

1 tablespoon lemon juice 2 tablespoons fresh dill, minced

¼ teaspoon garlic powder ¼ teaspoon salt

In small mixing bowl, combine softened cream cheese, mayo, dill, lemon juice, garlic powder and salt. Use a hand mixer or spoon to mix well. Peel the cucumber in stripes and cut into 1/8 inch slices using a mandolin or sharp knife. Cut the crust off of the bread to make squares. For each sandwich, spread about 1 tablespoon of cream cheese filling onto each piece of bread. Add thinly sliced cucumbers, fresh cracked pepper and additional fresh dill. Place the second piece of bread on top, then carefully cut into 4 triangles or squares.

Notes: How to keep a cucumber sandwich from getting soggy

Use English cucumbers, which have less water content than regular cucumbers due to their Smaller seeds.

Sprinkle the sliced cucumbers with salt and place them on paper towels to allow any additional moisture to drain before adding them to the sandwiches. (*You may want to omit the salt from the cream cheese filling if you go this route.) Spread cream cheese on both pieces of bread to create a barrier between the cucumbers and the bread.

Update from Your Newfane Schools

THANK YOU, NEWFANE! As we slowly inch our way closer and closer to a return to pre-pandemic school operations, the Board of Education and I would like to express our sincere thanks to everyone in the Newfane community for your support and encouragement throughout these very challenging two years. Since we first sent the kids home on March 16, 2020 as the COVID pandemic surged across our nation, we have consistently tried to provide the best possible experience for our students in spite of the difficult circumstances. As you know, the past two years have been a tremendous challenge for all of us, both here in the District and in the entire Newfane Community. As a district, we've had to make some difficult and costly decisions in order to be able to provide the best possible educational opportunities for our students. Our teachers, administrators and support staff have never worked harder to help ensure that every child, whether coming to school or learning at home, has had the support they need to be successful. Having the support of our community has never been more important for our students, and as usual, the Newfane community has been there throughout these challenges, working with the District and supporting our students and their families. It is when the going gets hardest that the true character of a community shines; and Newfane shines brighter than the sun!

You may remember that in the middle of the pandemic, the Newfane community overwhelmingly approved the \$30.5 million capital improvement project for the district. With Spring right around the corner, we are excited to see the first phase of the project- construction of a multi-sport athletic facility on the high school campus- ready to begin. On March 15, 2022 the school board and other district officials formally kicked off the capital project with a groundbreaking ceremony at Newfane High School. Town of Newfane supervisor John Syracuse joined Superintendent Mike Baumann and Board of Education President Margaux Lingle as they ceremoniously put the first "shovels in the ground". The capital project will be completed over two years; work in the first year will focus on the athletic facility, the high school and the elementary school. Year 2 of the project will see significant work at the middle school, including a refurbishing of the main office and the auditorium, as well as replacement of the roof and significant upgrades to the track and field facility. There is no doubt that the project will cause a pretty significant disruption, especially in our summer programming; but it will be well worth it in the end.

Speaking of summer programming, the District has already begun planning for the expansion of the summer academic programming we offered last year. Although construction at the high school and elementary will force all the summer programs to be housed at the middle school, we are using some of the federal stimulus monies to expand our offerings to meet the needs of all our students. Middle school Dean of Students Mrs. Aimee Chaffee has already begun working with teams of teachers to begin planning for summer academic activities that will allow our student to strengthen and enhance their academic skills this summer. Like last year, breakfast and lunch service will be provided for all our K-8 students who are involved in the summer program. In addition, the Newfane School District, in conjunction with the Town of Newfane, will be offering an afternoon summer recreation program. This program, which will run from noon until 3:00PM, will be available for our K-6 students. More information on our summer programs will be coming out

As it is every year, the Spring is also the time when we come to the pubic and ask for support for our school district budget.

The budget for the 2022-2023 school year carries only a nominal budget to budget increase of 1.9%. This year's budget will be about \$700,000 higher than the current year budget and the increase is largely due to the uncontrollable cost increases (health care costs, contractual salary increases, TRS/ERS and FICA increases) we deal with every year, which have been exacerbated by the recent growth in the inflation rate. However, by taking advantage of years of conservative spending, which has allowed us to accrue healthy reserves, the District has been able to construct a budget that allows us to maintain all of our current curricular and extra-curricular programs without significantly increasing the burden on our tax payers. In addition, the Board of Education is continuing the "No Supply List" initiative started in the 2021-2022 school year. No classroom supply lists will be sent home by our teachers for the 2022-2023 year- we will ensure that all the necessary student supplies are ordered by the District and provided to our students at no additional charge to the parents. We are also starting "Technological Literacy" program at the Elementary school next year to help our youngest students learn to take advantage of the technology we have available in our buildings in a safe, responsible and productive way.

In addition to our general operating budget, there will also be additional propositions recommending the establishment of two (2) "capital reserve" funds: one for technology and one for equipment. The reserve funds will allow the district to set aside monies incrementally to provide funding in future years for technology purchases and large equipment purchases (large mowers, snow plow trucks, etc.). Once these reserves are in place and monies placed in them, those large purchases will not have to be funded totally through the annual operating budget- which provides some protection against excessive annual tax increases.

On May 3, 2022 we will hold the required public Budget Hearing to explain our budget proposal and the reserve fund propositions in greater detail. That presentation will also be recorded, and will be available on our website after the budget hearing. However, if anyone has any questions about the budget, please don't hesitate to reach out to me at 716-778-6850. Budget presentation materials are also posted on the District website home page (under "Panther News").

The finalized budget for the 2022-2023 school year will be adopted by the Board of Education at its April meeting, and then presented to the public for approval on May 17, 2022. The budget vote and Board of Education election will be held in its traditional format- that is, in-person voting will be available at Newfane Elementary School (Aquatics Center entrance) form 12:00 noon until 8:00PM, and absentee ballots will be available upon request. Each winery on the trail offers a diverse selection of traditional vinifera style, native, late harvest and ice wines, as well as unique styles such as award-winning fruit wines, meads and ciders. Its mission is to "work cooperatively to enhance the wine industry in the region" through an array of intimately authentic and charming guest experiences.

Planning for Newfane's 2024 Bicentennial Celebration

Talk around town these days is more often turning to Newfane's 200-year anniversary approaching in 2024 and how we should celebrate this momentous bicentennial milestone. No decisions have been made about the type of events and scope of activities that might occur, but all agree that a successful commemoration of Newfane's rich cultural and historic heritage will take a couple of years of planning and community-wide involvement.

Before settlers came to this area in the early 1800s, what is now Newfane was a wilderness of dense trees and wetlands defined only by the Eighteen-Mile Creek, Lake Ontario and native trails. The Holland Land Company was granted rights to sell land across the region to speculators and pioneers who sought opportunities in the westward expansion of our young nation. Land in this area was first sold to pioneers in 1804 and settlement would increase significantly after the War of 1812 when Newfane was known as Charlotteville and Olcott was named Kempville. Niagara County was established by the State Legislature in 1808 and the entire county was known only as the Town of Cambria. It was quickly recognized that government administration needed to be organized closer to developing communities and from 1812 to 1836 Cambria would be subdivided into the twelve Niagara County towns we have today. Cambria was split and became Hartland east of the Eighteen-Mile Creek and Wilson was formed west of the creek in 1818, then the Town of Somerset was formed from Hartland and in 1824 Newfane was created from portions of Somerset, Hartland and Wilson.

Newfane marked its first 150 years in July of 1974 with a week-long sesquicentennial gala that included a pageant, theatrical performance, parades, games, concerts, shows and exhibits. Organizers established a corporation, sold shares and recruited patrons to help fund the celebration ... they had an executive committee, formed six management divisions and used more than twenty committees to keep it on track. The town also held a 175th anniversary in 1999 where a reenactment of the first town meeting, a pioneer picnic and other programs were scheduled throughout the year in conjunction with the apple festivals and other town functions. There were numerous local events during the 1976 U.S. bicentennial and the Niagara County bicentennial was held in 2008. The towns of Cambria, Hartland and Royalton have had recent bicentennial celebrations and other towns have anniversary dates coming up. Each community plans their activities and schedule a little different, some over a few weekends or a series of special days.

Preliminary talks have focused on how we will organize Newfane's bicentennial planning, which itself has generated many interesting ideas and suggestions about the type of activities that could take place. It looks like 2022 will be a time to ask all organizations and groups in the town to consider how they can support the effort; by identifying committees, teams and leaders, or in forming partnerships to boost participation. With a strong organization and committed leadership in place, 2023 can then be a period where resources, preparations and personnel come together to deliver a proud series of events honoring our community heritage in 2024.

A Facebook page 'Newfane 2024 Bicentennial Planning' has been created where those participating in bicentennial preparations can monitor and share information. Those interested in helping with bicentennial activities, and organizations that would like a representative to attend their meeting to provide information or assist with bicentennial planning, can leave a message at 716-778-8531 ext. #7.



The Town of Newfane Historical Society, local business and community associations, Newfane schools, the town tourism committee and groups such as the Lions clubs are already exploring bicentennial ideas. Planners envision that virtually every group and organization in the community can participate in some way; including churches and fire companies, businesses and civic groups, youth and veteran groups, families, alumni, seniors, sports teams, auxiliaries and neighborhoods. Newfane Supervisor John Syracuse has said he would like to see the town come together in a robust way to support an extraordinary bicentennial program. A commemorative booklet of Newfane history is in the works and 'Operation Sewing Squad', a local group formed two years ago to make Covid masks has already announced their members will begin making period costumes for the bicentennial. Look for news in the weeks ahead from a Steering Committee that is forming to guide bicentennial preparations, and just as important, consider initiating bicentennial discussions and ideas in the groups and places you frequent.

THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH FOOD PANTRY OF NEWFANE

The First Baptist Church Pantry is located at 6047 East Ave in Newfane. You can't miss it, because it is a cobblestone church with big double red doors. It serves the community in two ways. First its doors welcome everyone who wishes to seek inspirational guidance under the ministry of Pastor Kim Smith. Second, it houses a food pantry under the management of Linda Peace.

Originally the Food Pantry was located in Olcott and had served the Migrant Ministries. It was than relocated to The First Baptist Church in Newfane, where today it not only takes care of the migrants and their families, who come to work on the local farms, but has expanded to assisting the families in the community that are in need of food.

Through the New York State grants and USDA donations, Mrs. Peace is able to purchase healthy foods as well as basic staples at a low rate through the WNY food Bank. The pantry also receives left over fresh produce and eggs from the local farmers. Fresh Breads and desserts are picked up weekly from the local store. Local organizations do food drives and donate monetary gifts. Donations of basic need items such as toothbrushes, toothpaste, razors, toilet paper, shampoos, soap etc. that cannot be purchased with food stamps are always welcomed.

The pantry is open from 1pm to 6pm on Wednesdays. Families can register for service, or to receive emergency food, and come twice a month to receive a three day supply of food each time, to help stretch their funds and get them through a month.

Mrs. Peace, along with her volunteer team work to create a welcome friendly environment for anyone who seek assistance, with respect and kindness.



Fill out a form in the Water Office along with a voided check Credit and debit cards will no longer be accepted when paying in person or by mail. However, you can now make your water/sewer payment on-line, using you credit card or debit card. To create an account online:

Go to townofnewfane.com

On the homepage, in the top right corner, click 'Pay Town Bills' then 'Pay Water'

A screen will pop up asking for username and password. If you are a first time user, click on "register here"

Enter your information and click "register" you will receive a message that says "registration was successful". A temporary password will be sent to your email, which will allow you in to make your payment and change your password.

Be sure to record your username and password for future use. There is a night drop box located on the north side of Town Hall, to the right of the door. Payments when dropped go into a secure locked box. Any payments left the evening of due date will be accepted the next morning on time with no late penalties.

August 1st of each year we remove all unpaid balances to the fol¬lowing years County tax bill. A tax removal fee of 10% is added to your bill.

Garbage Reminders

Handles on your garbage tote face the house. Please pay attention to the arrows on the top of the lid. The arm of the garbage truck must be able to dump your tote into the top of the loader and can only do so if the totes are positioned correctly.

Large Item Pick-up is the third full week of collection each month. Please adhere to three large items on your garbage day during bulk pick-up week. Please note that a second truck comes back around for the large items, so your tote may be emptied first.

Leaf and yard waste must now be contained in your appropriate garbage tote. You can no longer put bags of leaves and yard waste to the curb. Should you require another garbage tote, please contact the Water Depart¬ment at 716-778-8132 extension 6 to purchase and one will be delivered. We have large garbage totes available for \$80.00 and small totes available for \$50.00. Please be advised an additional annual fee of \$56 applies to any additional tote.

NOTICE

Effective May 1, 2021 the following rules will be enforced for the town wide brush Pick-up:

All branches MUST be piled as neatly as possible with ALL CUT ENDS FACING the road and NO LONGER then 10 ft long.

Tree removal companies are responsible to remove ALL of their own debris.

We will NOT pick up large stumps, leaves, rubbish, etc.

A maximum amount of 2 tandem truck loads will be picked up at a time at any one residence.

We will NOT pick up branches in front of wooded lots that are being cleared.

We will NOT be responsible for any damages to anything that is under the pile of brush that we cannot see. Large piles are picked up with large machinery.
