Update from the Supervisor's Office

Summer seems to be moving along rather swiftly these days. Olcott continues to make headlines across the tourism spectrum after another successful Fourth of July celebration. In addition, Olcott Beach has experienced an increase in activity and foot traffic this season. This result, in a large part, is due to the commitment from the local businesses and the many, many volunteers who work tirelessly to promote our area. There have been some magnificent pictures taken of Olcott this year, especially from the 4th of July. If anyone wishes to submit photos which capture the essence of what Olcott-Newfane offers, please forward a digital copy to the Town Hall, along with your name, address and a statement authorizing the photo's release to the Town of Newfane. I will forward your photo to our Tourism Committee. Perhaps you will see your picture in one of the many marketing publications we offer!

This is a perfect time to provide an update on the REDI Projects. After what seemed like forever, "temporary" East Pier Access has again been re-established. It is temporary until the new Hedley-Zillig construction starts and is subsequently completed. At that point, new access will occur. Until then, we will be utilizing the "corral-style" access of years past. Take a walk out on both the East and West Piers and enjoy the million-dollar view. Check out the fishing platforms. It is also a great place to sit and read a book or just take in the scenery!

Planning and scheduling of work is on-going regarding paving to Ontario Street Parking lot, in addition to upgrading the existing bathroom with a new 2-stall, ADA Compliant restroom. The Town Board recently selected a bathroom structure, style and color and has advised the consultants of such. I hesitate to give a more solid start and completion date on work at this time, but best estimates seem to put completion toward the end of August.

As of the writing of this article, The REDI West Beach Berm project was awarded to Mark Cerrone, Inc. and should be under way by the time you receive this publication. Bids were received 7/12/22 on the other REDI Project, Inner Harbor Stabilization. These bids are currently under review by our consultant. Over the next few weeks, the Board will be evaluating recommendations brought forth by our consultant. Stay tuned for further updates at the town board meetings.

US POSTAGE PAID BUFFALO, NY PERMIT #912	It may go without saying, but work is complete to the Breakwall, Piers, Ontario Street water line construction and the subsequent repaving of the Lockport-Ontario-Cooper and Main Streets. Striping is almost complete. Curb cuts still need to occur to the crosswalks. The FEMA Shoreline Construction Initiative, north of the replica lighthouse, was completed 5/18/22. This project was further enhanced by the efforts of our Highway Dept. If you haven't seen this, one should cruise up to the foot of Lockport/Ontario Streets and observe the increase in area to the shoreline which underlies the Lakeview Village Shoppes. This addition- al shoreline provides yet another valuable point-of-access for the public. In other infrastructure news, the Town is performing an update to the water system in the area of Route 18 which should enhance pressures and water quantity to the northeast portion of the Town. We continue pace with improvements to our Wastewater Treatment Plant. We are excited to be completing these much-needed capital projects. We have

Even though we are in the heat of summer, over the next few weeks I will be scheduling budget meetings with various department heads, elected officials, and committee heads to go over the 2022 budget vs. actuals and start planning for 2023. The Town has been experiencing some of the same issues residents have raised relating to garbage collection. Collectively, we seem to continually raise the same concerns some of you have such as missed garbage pick-up, incomplete pick-up, broken totes and trash strewn throughout our yards. I take these matters very seriously. Despite the Town repeatedly logging these complaints with Modern, these problems still occur at an all-too-often rate. I met as recently as 6/27/22 with Modern Representatives, Mr. Gary Rog—Municipal Account Manager and Mr. Marcus T. Thomas—Operations Manager along with town employees to get to the bottom of our frustrations. Some concerns seemed to be addressed immediately such solving the issue of parked cars obstructing garbage collection on Main Street. I am in process of arranging a ride-along or follow-along with Modern to observe the way their drivers serve our community. FAQ's New Cart-Based Program

HOW IS TRASH AND RECYCLING COLLECTED IN A TOTE/CART-BASED PROGRAM?

Totes/carts are collected using an automated or semi-automated collection device attached to the collection vehicle. Acceptable waste and recycling must fit in your tote/cart with the lid closed. Place at the streets edge the night before or by 6am the day your collection is scheduled.

WHAT IS THE BEST WAY TO PLACE MY TOTE/CART FOR COLLECTION?

Place totes/carts a minimum of three (3) feet away from cars, mailboxes and other objects. Handles/wheels should face towards your residence with the lid closed. Totes/carts that do not close risk damaging the lid and hinges by the truck. Place totes/carts at the streets edge either the night before or by 6am the day of collection.

MAY I USE A CAN OR CART NOT PROVIDED BY MY COMMUNITY? No, only totes/carts issued by your community will be collected.

WHAT ITEMS ARE COLLECTED?

Acceptable waste and recycling **must fit in your tote/cart with the lid closed**. Place at the streets edge the night before or by 6am the day your collection is scheduled.

WHAT IF I HAVE TRASH THAT WON'T FIT IN MY FULL TOTE/CART?

If you need more capacity for trash and recycling, contact the Water Department for additional service options. 716-778-8132 extension 6.

WHAT ARE BAG TAGS?

Bag Tag Stickers can be purchased through the Water Department, 716-778-8132 extension 6 for \$5 each. You are allowed up to 5 tagged bags per week. Bag Tag Stickers can be placed on bags of waste when you have the occasional need for more service capacity (trash tote/cart is full). Bag Tag Stickers are placed on 30-gallon size bags (40 pound weight limit). You will place the bags with pre-pur-chased Bag Tag Stickers next to your full trash tote/cart and in clear view of the driver. Driver will only collect bags with a sticker. Do not place stickers on trash cans and do not place bags with stickers in trash cans.

WHEN ARE LARGE ITEMS COLLECTED?

The Town of Newfane's large item collection is the third *full* week of every month. You get 3 large items on your garbage day during the designated week. Please refer to the large item graphic on page 3 on what is accepted.

WHAT DO I DO IF MY TOTE/CART IS DAMAGED BY MODERN DISPOSAL?

Please contact the Water Department at 716-778-8132 extension 6 as soon as possible. We will in turn contact Modern to look at video on the truck to determine where the tote/cart was damaged. Please note this is extremely time sensitive- a date and time must be noted.

HAS RECYCLING COLLECTION CHANGED?

A menu of the "Best Items to Recycle" is listed on page 4. Acceptable materials for recycling must be placed loose in your recycling tote/cart with the lid closed. For safety reasons, recyclables placed in a bag will be considered waste and will be disposed of.

Cardboard flattened and properly sized should be placed next to your full tote/cart for collection. Cardboard and other acceptable recyclables will be collected ONLY if the driver can safely place it back into your tote/cart once its emptied. To ensure collection, flatten and size cardboard so it can fit into your emptied cart with the lid closed. Cardboard stacked on TOP of your tote/cart will not be collected. If additional recycling totes/carts are needed, please contact the Water Department at 716-778-8132 extension 6 to purchase.

**Cardboard boxes will no longer be collected as trash on your "off" recycling week.

The town of Newfane encourages everyone to recycle. Modern Disposal gives the Town a commission check for a percentage of our recycling. The more we recycle, the more we are able to mitigate the costs of refuse collection to our residents.

Additional Information:

- 1. Loose materials must be bundled or contained
- Bundled material cannot exceed 4 foot in length and 18 inches in diameter
- Freon must be removed and tagged by a licensed professional
- No item can exceed 60 pounds in weight
- 5. All items must be easily managed by two employees
- 6. Do not stack bundled items
- 7. Cushions are acceptable with the couch
- 8. No bagged debris

Niagara County Legislature 14th District Legislator Shawn Foti

Happy Summer 2022! I hope everyone is enjoying their summer and experiencing all of the fun activities our region has to offer. It has been an extremely busy first 6 months in the Niagara County Legislature and I am enjoying the hard work serving the 14th District. We have a great team at the county amongst all 15 Legislators and the various department heads. Whether we agree or disagree on each topic, everyone works together and stays goal oriented. I am proud of the teamwork throughout the county, and I feel Niagara County residents should be pleased to know they are well represented at the county level with respectful and common-sense public servants.

Krull Park has been a handful to say the least! A few days before Easter, a wind storm sent a massive tree branch through the Lions Club Pavilion, causing extensive damage. I started making phone calls to the county parks director and Supervisor Syracuse. We were able to clean up the mess and make it safe the very next day. Very great response from our staff at county parks with help from the town. Bids went out and the roof was repaired just days before the park opened Memorial Day weekend. I recently hosted a meeting at the park which included the Commissioner of Public Works, head of county parks, Supervisor Syracuse, local residents and community organizations to bring together ideas for the future and also to address immediate concerns. The meeting was very productive and provided direct feedback. Residents were able to explain their concerns and were offered agreeable solutions. This is the type of transparency and accountability that our residents should expect from government. The park is seeing record usage this year, which is great, but obviously causes issues. Our crews are doing the best they can while also facing staffing shortages. Please be patient but also continue to enjoy the beautiful park.

County-Wide EMS:

I am very proud to announce at our June meeting the Legislature passed a resolution which begins the process of creating a county run ambulance service. A county run ambulance service came at the request of Emergency Services Director Jonathan Schultz, the Fire Advisory Board and the County Chiefs Association. This service will be to supplement the volunteer EMS organizations and reduce the amount of long response times for EMS care. It will also act as a transport service working in conjunction with the volunteer department, which will allow the volunteer department to remain in the district in case of another call. Some calls require 3-plus hours due to travel time to the hospital and wait time at the hospital. Our volunteer departments do an amazing job, but they are also seeing higher call volume, longer travel distance to hospitals, longer wait times for a bed at the ER, increasing NYS regulations and requirements, aging and decreasing membership, and more demanding work/family life. Please consider becoming a volunteer, even if you only have a few hours per month to offer.

Infrastructure:

Locally, we are seeing our county crews paving and repairing roads every day. I cosponsored a resolution which directed American Rescue Plan funds to support an Accessibility Project at the Niagara County Fairgrounds. This project includes new paved walkways, more ADA accessible areas, drainage to reduce flooding, and upgrades to the overall property infrastructure. A large portion of this project will be completed prior to the fair in August and the remaining work will be finished in the spring. Our DPW staff and management works extremely hard to keep our roads smooth and safe. Please respect the workers while on the road and slow down in construction zones.

Let's all enjoy our summer and focus on the many blessings we are offered every day. We have a wonderful community full of fantastic people who are dedicated on making this a safe, fun, and unified place to live. There is more that connects us than divides us. I am proud to represent you all at the county and I am always available to serve your needs.


To help our greater community I am again partnering with the outstanding Peter Robinson and his volunteers for a PB&J Drive. This session was a busy one at our state Capitol. Despite my overall objection to the 2022-23 State Budget, because it was done without public input, substantial reforms, or long-term fiscal responsibility, there were measures I worked hard on which were included in the final agreement.

First, a bipartisan agreement to allow fire companies to recover costs for providing emergency medical services was part of the final deal. This has been a top priority for me and I was a sponsor of the original bill (A.534). This is wonderful news for our fire companies and for public safety.

I was out front calling for a suspension of the state's gasoline taxes way back in 2021, and this was the first act my Conference and I took together upon returning to the Capitol for the new legislative term. Our plan suspended motor fuel taxes for two years along with taxes on household essentials, cleaning products, and personal care items (A.8481). I also sponsored a bipartisan bill temporarily removing state taxes on motor fuels (A.9503) which was eventually included in the final State Budget. I feel our state leaders could have done more to combat inflation, but this is a start.

I am working hard for you and our community. Op-Ed: The Safety of our Children Must Remain Priority Senator Rob Ortt, SD-62

The safety and security of children and students must always remain a priority in New York. While recent events of pure evil and violence have rattled our state and nation, the need to address the root cause of the problem is more urgent than ever.

I recently held several meetings with school superintendents, school board members, teachers, and parents from throughout the 62nd Senate District regarding school safety. We discussed the need for state funding of School Resource Officers (SROs) in every school building, implementing technology that would safeguard students, faculty, and staff, and improving the availability of mental health services to students at all levels of schooling.

When asking the schools in my district if a full-time SRO is wanted by parents, teachers, and administrators, the resounding answer is: "of course." Unfortunately, paying for these officers has proven to be a challenge for some of the smaller and more rural schools in my district. My colleagues in the Legislature need to understand that when safety policies are passed, we need to provide proper funding. New York needs school safety equity: no school should have to go without an SRO.

Another hurdle faced by our schools is the lack of a timely approval process by New York State for school hardening plans. There is no excuse for districts to be waiting several months, or more, to get state approval. Each day that passes before a safety project is signed off is another day that our children could be at risk. To ensure that technologies and other important improvements are implemented quickly, there must be a more streamlined and efficient process.

Last, but not least, our schools are faced with a severe lack of adequate mental health services, both in and out of the classroom. The past two years have taken a mental toll on students. Due to current law, school psychologists who see patients in school are unable to meet with these same students outside of the building's walls. Because of this stipulation, not only is there a lack of in-school psychologists available, but parents are now forced to seek outside help for any additional services. We must increase the number of professionals entering the pediatric psychology field by removing this roadblock. By passing legislation that allows school psychologists to help our students both in and out of the classroom, we will be able to provide the care and support they need.

Efforts to increase school safety must remain a priority in the state Legislature. My colleagues and I recently introduced the 'Safer NY Plan,' an extensive legislative package equipped to prevent targeted violence against New Yorkers. The package involves re-investing in the mental health system, deterring and fighting violent crime, supporting communities with violence prevention Task Forces, and more.

All New Yorkers must be safe from violence, and as legislative officials, we must do everything in our power to prevent further tragedies. Our Conference is committed and stands ready to enact real solutions to protect our school children.

The Niagara County Sheriff's Office is pleased to update you on several of our initiatives that will occur throughout the next few months! NCSO has collaborated with the Niagara County Legislature to acquire epinephrine auto-injector devices, also known as Epi-Pens, which will be equipped in every patrol car on duty. Every member of our criminal division became certified in Epi-Pen deployment earlier this year, and there is no doubt this resource will better protect our community, and save lives.

Summer is our Community Services Division's busiest time of the year, and we would like to be sure to invite you to our events! The Niagara County Fair will take place August 3rd through the 7th – NCSO will be on location with our community partners providing resource information and opportunities, staff on site to answer your questions, and of course K9 demonstrations! In addition, we are happy to announce the return of Law Enforcement Day at the Olcott Carousel Park on Saturday August 13th. NCSO and our friends with the New York State Police and Department of Environmental Conservation Police will be at the park from noon to 2pm for an afternoon of fun and teamwork.

Finally, our Traffic Safety Office will hold car seat check events several times over the next few weeks. Stop by the Kidz N Kites event in North Tonawanda on September 17th from 10:30am to 2:30pm, or the Pendleton Station Market on September 18th from 9:00am to 1pm for a professional inspection. Appointments for other dates and times may be arranged through Coordinator Cathy Davis at (716) 438-3464.

At the time of this writing, we are well into the summer months here in Olcott, and all the enjoyable activities the season brings.



To date, the Olcott Fire Company has responded to 440 calls in 2022, including EMS, fires, accidents, inclement weather, providing mutual aid for our neighboring Fire Companies, and boat calls. We've also been invited to send Firefighters to the Great New York State Fair in August to teach kids how to survive a house fire at the Public Safety Building.

OFC has welcomed new members Dylan Baker, Matthew Schultz, Robert Baker, Tom Marvin, and Anthony Volpe, who moved up into the position of Active Firefighter from our Junior Firefighter program. Two of our members, Jacob Traverse and Jon Costanzo spent many months going through training to become certified EMT's this spring, and current EMT Nolin Jackson completed his training to become NYS-AEMT (Advanced Level).

After many years of faithful service, we will be retiring our Engine #4 this coming autumn, and taking possession of a new Engine/Pumper, which is currently being built.





Drainage Management in Newfane Is Challenging and Complex

The management of storm run-off and drainage has been a vexing problem for generations of Newfane residents. Our lake plain profile and Newfane's flat terrain keep the area immune from the ravaging flash floods that occur in other parts of New York, but heavy rains that swell ditches, drainageways and wetlands in our community still create potential health risks and cause inundating flooding to farmland, roads, property and basements. Damage and impacts associated with poor drainage are most commonly defined as shallow flooding, which differs from riverine (creeks overtopping banks) and coastal (lakeshore) flooding. The Town of Newfane is a participant in the Niagara County Hazard Mitigation Plan, which is currently being updated and highlights that flooding is the most serious natural hazard Newfane faces, resulting in average annual losses of \$549,000 to Newfane properties from 1996 to 2017.

Settlers were attracted to this area in the 1800s because of the rich soils produced after the retreating ice age carved out our lake plain below the ridge, but they also found an area dominated by dense woodlands and sprawling wetlands where mosquitos and insects made life inhospitable. In areas below the ridge, wet and unhealthy marshlands forced many settlers to abandon the region and return east. In their first season here, the Van Horn family wrote they were overcome by 'swamp fever' (anemia) and forced back east to survive the winter; then returning the next year to complete construction of mills on the Eighteen Mile Creek.

Natural drainage in Newfane has also been influenced by two hundred years of man-made alterations that often came with unintended consequences. When the Erie Canal was being completed in the 1820s it was discovered that the fall of 155 feet from the Ridge to Lake Ontario provided an efficient drainage pathway for canal design, but it also changed drainage patterns below the ridge and increased moisture retention in stagnant, poorly drained areas. Decades old bridge, highway and rail construction also affected the town's drainage profile, and increasing population and housing growth has made drainage a principal issue of community concern. In the Newfane village and Burt, natural drainage was dramatically altered when the trolley line was built in 1900, plus village expansion influenced drainage from McKee Street, through East Avenue to north of Edward Avenue. The once navigable Honeoye Creek along East Lake Road has been reduced to a mere trickle after more than one hundred and fifty years of farmland development and highway expansion. The same goes for portions of Hopkins Creek at West Lake Road and its path south along Coomer Road. Many observers note that off-land drainage to Lake Ontario contributes as much to lakeshore bank erosion as the lake itself and in the center and south of Newfane excess precipitation sits in flat wetlands below the ridge and is slow to absorb or move to the creek.

As you drive around Newfane and other areas, notice how early settlers smartly built their farmhouses on rising slopes, berms or dug ponds to use the excavation to raise their structures as a flood prevention measure. The generally accepted principal applied most widely is that drainage cannot be altered in a way that will flood or harm up or downstream properties. Through most of Newfane's history, drainage had been managed by local farmers who cleared and mowed ditches to maintain agricultural production, but where land use has shifted away from agriculture, ditches are not being maintained, thus increasing flood threats and health concerns. An essential first step going forward is for property owners and the community to work together on a drainage management plan. In instances where wide-ranging public benefits can be achieved, the Town of Newfane has worked cooperatively with landowners to establish easements that give the town access to mow ditches, which prevents growth and debris from blocking drainageways. Easements do not take over or change the ownership of property, they only allow the town or neighboring landowners access to perform mutually beneficial tasks such as drainage maintenance, waterline installation or transit across adjoining properties. Using general tax revenue from all town property owners is not considered the best solution for drainage management because only certain properties or areas of the town are at risk, but other communities have applied state public benefit law to adopt special use taxation or for drainage districts, just as we use district taxation to fund sewer, water, lighting and fire protection services.

State environmental laws encourage property owners and local governments to pursue sound environmental practices for drainage management. Regulations govern the scope of work and set limits on the actions property owners and towns can undertake to alter or maintain natural drainage, but the law does not assign responsibility and does not provide funding for drainage control. To prevent flood damage and insure citizen's health, property owners and community leaders must work cooperatively toward improved ditch, stream and drainage management.

RABIES IMMUNIZATION CLINICS

The Niagara County Department of Health in cooperation with the Niagara County Veterinary Society has TWO FREE Rabies Immunization Clinics remaining in the 2022 season. APPOINTMENTS FOR RABIES CLINIC ARE NOW MANDATORY AND THE REGIS-TRATION LINK WILL BE AVAILABLE ONLINE AT WWW.NIAGAR-ACOUNTY.COM/HEALTH.

By law, all cats, dogs and domesticated ferrets must have a current rabies vaccination from 4 months of age on.

Please bring prior proof of Rabies Vaccination with you if at all possible. Cats and dogs receiving immunization WITHOUT PROOF of a previous rabies immunization will receive a certificate valid for only one year. Cats and dogs WITH PROOF of a previous rabies immunizations will receive a rabies certificate valid for three years.

Ferrets must receive vaccinations annually, regardless of previous immunizations.

Clinics are FREE OF CHARGE to animals owned by Niagara County residents.

ALL ANIMALS must be properly restrained.

Cats and Ferrets must be in a box or carrier. Dogs must be leashed.

The Department does not offer dog or cat vaccinations other than rabies. It is very important for the health and well being of your animal and the other animals attending our rabies clinics, that they have seen a veterinarian and are up to date on all of their immunizations, to include dog parvo virus.

Volunteers are welcomed. Please call 439-7511 if interested.

Veterinary Services provided by the Niagara County Veterinary Society.

It is requested that anyone bringing more than six animals to one clinic contact the Niagara County Department of Health at 439-7511 up to one week prior to the clinic so paperwork can be processed more efficiently.

REMINDER: Every year thousands of dogs suffer from heat-related injuries or deaths that are totally preventable. If your pets are kept outdoors during the summer months, be sure to provide shelter for them. They must be protected from the hot sun and have plenty of fresh water available at all times. Never leave your pet in a vehicle during the hot summer months. There is NO SUCH THING as safe car time, even with the windows cracked, in the shade or "just for a while". In 90 degree weather, a car's interior temperature can soar to more than 120 degrees in minutes. That is potentially lethal. Once dogs begin to overheat, they start to pant. In that kind of heat, panting can't cool them down, but it does emit even more heat. That is a vicious cycle that can cost you your pet.

REMINDER: Place the back of your hand on asphalt or concrete for a minimum of 6 seconds. If it's too hot for you it's too hot for your pet's paws.

DEER MANAGEMENT PERMITS (Doe Permits): Please be certain to purchase your tags by the end of September to have a full choice of regions. The first round allows you to select your region of choice and will help you build preference points in the event your first pick is not successful. The cost is 2 picks for \$10.00. If you miss the first round your region may not be available as a selection in the second round and you will need to pay the \$10.00. If you purchased permits in the first round the second round is free.

Lifetime License Holders: We have a copy of the Lifetime License Information Sheet in our office and also on our website in the Clerk's section under Hunting & Fishing Licenses should you need it for reference. Adults: Once you have purchased your lifetime license, all future licenses and tags (that are applicable to your account) will be sent to you annually from the DEC fulfillment center by September 1st provided you have the appropriate sportsman education in your file. If you have not received your tags by September 1st please contact the DEC to verify the address they were mailed to. You may apply for a first round Deer Management Permit online, by phone or at any agent location. You do not need to wait for your lifetime license to come in the mail to apply for your Deer Management Permits. August 2022 Message from the Superintendent of Schools, Michael Baumann:

As we prepare for the start of what is sure to be an eventful and exciting school year, the Board of Education, the faculty, staff, students and I would like to thank the entire Newfane Community for their outstanding support, cooperation and encouragement over the past two years, as we've gone from fully remote learning, to hybrid, to masked and now finally back into some semblance of what we once considered normal. It was never an easy journey, but it was definitely made smoother thanks to our close, cooperative relationship with the Town of Newfane, our local businesses, church and community organizations. THANK YOU, NEWFANE!

This has certainly been an unusually busy summer for us in the District. Throughout July and August, we had nearly 200 students take advantage of our Summer Academic Enrichment program for our K-8 students. For five outstanding weeks, small groups of students had the opportunity to meet with teachers at Newfane Middle School to strengthen their academic skills through interactive grade level appropriate activities. This is the first year that District staff were responsible for designing and implementing the program at all grade levels, and the thirty-six faculty and support staff members who worked with our students did a tremendous job providing opportunities for our students to strengthen academic skills that may not have gotten enough attention as we strived to get back up to post-pandemic speed this past year.

The District was also thrilled to be collaborating with the Town of Newfane this summer to once again be able to provide a Summer Recreation Program for our students. Thanks to Town Supervisor John Syracuse and Town Board member Sue Neidlinger reaching out to the District, we were able to come together as a united team to re-conceive a summer program for our students that paralleled our academic program and allowed the District to take the lead on providing a much-needed program for the kids in our community. Over a hundred children took advantage of the summer rec program, getting them off their phones, away from the video screens and outside in the fresh air and sunshine for a couple hours a day.

In addition to the academic enrichment for our students, we also have many of our instructional staff participating in professional development this summer. The Office of Curriculum and Instruction, under the guidance of it's Director, Pete Young, offered a wide variety of opportunities for our teachers to continue to improve their craft. Whether it be diving deep into curriculum and instruction, developing skills for dealing with students in crisis, or sharpening their technological savvy, nearly all our staff takes advantage of the many opportunities available for ongoing professional learning.

Of course, I can't talk about the many things happening on campus this summer without mentioning the continuing work on the Capital Improvement Project. You may recall that just about five months ago on March 15 we broke ground on the \$30.5 million capital project. If you haven't passed by the high school campus in the past couple of months, please take the time to do so. The progress on the multisport athletic complex, the crown jewel of the capital project now officially known as "Panther Field", has been very exciting to watch. I also encourage you to visit our website (www.newfane.wnyric.org) where weekly time-lapse videos of the construction of the athletic complex are posted. Keep an eye on the website for information on the date for the grand opening of the stadium this Fall- I promise you it won't be something you want to miss.

Less conspicuous but every bit as exciting is the capital project work happening inside the high school. The reconfiguration of the main office and entryway, the re-tiling of the walls and ceiling, the expansion of the multi media center in the library and the exciting wall graphics featuring historical photos from both the town and the district will present our high school students with a fresh, new look in the building to start the new school year. This summer's work is also focused in the Elementary building, where the student lavatories are being redone and the main entryway is also being made secure. Throughout all the buildings, the door security hardware has been replaced, allowing teachers to secure their rooms against intruders with the push of a button. The roofs at both the high school and elementary, which we were fortunately able to start before the school year ended thanks to the good weather, were finished up early in the summer.

In spite of all the work being done in and around the district this summer, we will be ready to welcome our staff back on August 31, and our students back on September 7 to start the new school year. And please remember, the Board of Education once again included funding for the "No-Lists" initiative in the school budget. There is no need to do any of the dreaded "back-to-school" shopping for notebooks, pencils, crayons and glue. When our students arrive in their classrooms in September, the things they need to start the school year will be waiting for them in their classrooms or at their desks.

**If you are a new homeowner and it will be your primary residence, you need to register with the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance for STAR Credit. You will receive your Star savings in the form of a check directly from New York State instead of receiving a school property tax exemption. Visit www.tax.ny.gov or call (518) 457-2036.

Current Basic Star Exemption recipients ONLY If you are over 65 or turning 65 years of age by December 31, 2023, you may qualify for the Enhanced Star Exemption if your Adjustable Gross Income for 2021 was \$93,200 or less. This exemption will be applied to the upcoming 2023 assessment roll. To file for this exemption, the following items are needed: (1) Proof of age, (2) A copy of your 2021 Income Tax, (Federal or State), and (3) Proof of your New York State residency. ALSO it is now MANDATORY for all Enhanced STAR applicants to file a RP-425-Income Verification Program form. This form authorizes NY State Department of Taxation and Finance to annually verify income using your Social Security number. If you feel you qualify for Enhanced, please stop in the office no later than March 1, 2023 to file your paperwork.

For the rest of July and August, if you are looking for a transient boat slip - call our office as soon as possible because we are filling up fast. Or just come visit us and take your boat, jet ski, or kayak out for the day on the lake!

TOWN OF NEWFANE MARINA RULES 716-778-5462

Fueling at gas dock only! See attendant for special circumstances.
 Reservations will be accepted on the first Saturday in April. At this time we will take reservations for the entire year.

3. There will be NO refunds on reservations made in advance. Credit vouchers only for special cases.

4. There will be NO sub-leasing reservations.

5. If the Marina Director is not notified at least one day in advance of the leaser's inability to keep their reservation, the Town of Newfane reserves the right to lease that dock on a day to day basis.

6. Never tie up to electrical posts.

7. The Town of Newfane reserves the right to place your boat in a space that helps us make the best use of the area we have to work with. We guarantee a "tie up", not a specific location.

8. The bow pulpit or gear should not extend over the walkway.

9. All pets must be on a leash at all times and properly cleaned up after.

10. Overnight docking will be from 1:00 PM to 1:00 PM. At 1:01 you will be charged for an additional day.

11. Daytime visitor docking will be restricted to two (2) hours. All boats must register with the Marina office.

12. Available docking will be designated by the Marina Director or designated attendant on a day to day basis.

13. No open fires will be allowed on boardwalks, bulkheads, docks or boats. A pavilion is provided for your use.

14. Not responsible for damage or slippage due to fowl or any animal droppings.

- 15. No on premises camping and no sleeping in vehicles.
- 16. Parking will be designated by the Marina attendant.

17. Riding of bicycles, skateboards, and etc. will NOT be permitted at the Marina for safety reasons.

18. Unattached boat trailers will be left in the upper parking lot only. Those in violation will be moved by the Marina attendant at the owner's expense.

- 19. All boats must be launched at the ramp only.
- 20. No unreasonable or disruptive noise.
- 21. Fish cleaning is allowed at the Fish Cleaning Station ONLY!
- 22. There will be a \$5.00 replacement charge for lost keys.

23. Any dingy not stored on a boat must be paid for by boat length. (behind or beside boat)

24. A three (3) day launch pass is for consecutive days only.

25. There will be no children under the age of 16 permitted in the marina without adult supervision.

All boat operators and passengers shall comply with all Marina rules and shall obey all instructions and directions of the Marina Director or the Marina attendant. Failure to obey Marina rules or to comply with directions and instructions of the Marina Director or the Marina attendant will result in revocation of privileges to use the Town of Newfane Marina.

MILLER HOSE FIRE COMPANY

Fire Chief Jason Coleman

As of June 30th, Miller Hose has responded to 513 total calls. This number is comprised of 97 fires, accidents, mutual aid and service type calls along with 416 EMS emergency type calls. The EMS emergency calls are broken down into two types of response calls: 277 BLS (Basic Life Support) and 139 ALS (Advanced Life Support). The major percentage of the total calls relate to EMS type responses as recommended by the NCSD Dispatch Unit and standard protocol of care procedures. To date, this average is 2.2 calls per day with time involved that can vary from an hour to several hours of care provided. This call time comes on top of the dedicated time in constant training, familiarization with new on- board medical equipment, changing protocols/procedures and recertification of one's Basic, Advanced or Paramedic classification. Also involved are the first responders who answer the calls to assist the EMT, drive the ambulance or assist at the scene. These conditions are also present for our neighbor Area 3 Mutual Aid fire companies. The bottom line to either a BLS or an ALS call is to preserve a life or render first aid to a person in an emergency. To those, we offer our thanks and gratitude.

Congratulations to Jennifer Killion having completed all the requirements of classroom and hands on training and receiving her certification as an EMT-B technician.

Three new members have been added to the Miller Hose active roster. They are Dakota Jeffords, Richie Lawton and Patrick Carpenter. Patrick upon turning 18, moved from the roster of the MHC Junior Fire Fighters to the active roster after several years holding office and training as a Junior Fire Fighter.

Upcoming on September 17th is the Company's annual Gun & \$5000 Cash Raffle. Due to an increase in the procurement cost and supply chain of 4wheelers, it was decided by the Committee to offer the cash prize of \$5000 in place of the 4wheeler. All else remains in place. There will be a total of 30 prizes awarded along with many side raffles, 50/50's plus door prizes. Beverages and food consisting of Roast Beef on Weck, Italian Sausage plus more great food. Dishes will be served to INDIVIDUAL TICKET HOLD-ERS ONLY. Our recent encounter with severe weather in the Town of Newfane on June 15th, resulted in the Miller Hose Fire Company being dispatched to approximately 14 service calls in the span of 15-20 minutes. The calls consisted of fallen trees or limbs on power lines/houses, trees blocking the roadways, transformer fires and resulting power outages. Storms of this nature at times are beginning to be more intense and dangerous to both firefighters and the general public. Caution should always be first most in one's mind when these situations are present. Downed wires of any type should be avoided until neutralized. If in a vehicle and wires are present, remain in the vehicle until wires are removed by emergency personnel. Ground transmission of electricity from live wires may be present in the area. Road closures may involve Fire Police directing traffic away from a normal path of foot or vehicle travel. Their actions may create a temporary inconvenience but are necessary to maintain a safe secure area for other emergency operations to function. They are there to help NOT hinder. Please obey their directions.

The Boot Drive that was held in May during the Newfane Historical Society Festival was very successful due to all that generously donated. Funds collected from the Boot Drive and the Annual Fund Drive letter have been used to purchase new battery-operated rescue tools to be placed on the fire trucks.


